Sound Artist Maura Murnane Offers a Unique Take on A Classic Song at OCC Art Exhibit

Orange Coast College's Frank M. Doyle Arts Pavilion presents "And I Will Always Forever... (1 Hour)" by sound artist Maura Murnane through Oct. 12.

The multimedia installation is on display in the Art Pavilion's project gallery, and plays a manipulated version of a Whitney Houston hit song on repeat for one hour in overlapping fragments, with a sound that mimics the waves of the ocean. The result is a meditative and emotional listening experience.

"The discordant, yet hauntingly beautiful sound comes from multiple exposed audio units, quietly surrounded by large, sound-dampening monoliths," says curator Kim Garrison. "The music's wash of vibration combined with the stillness of these large objects serves to pull this familiar top-forty hit

out of time and space. The resulting psychic tension is a place for reflection on the song's themes, its staging in a highly designed public environment, and its shifting cultural context throughout the decades of our lives."

Murnane is a recent graduate of the University of California, Irvine's Master of Fine Arts program. Born in Saudi Arabia, Murnane's work involves creating installations that bring together intersecting worlds of consumerism and spirituality. Her work also investigates themes of emotional and material entropy, object transformation, and the impossibility of constancy.

The Doyle Arts Pavilion is open from 11 a.m. until 5 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, and 11 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Thursdays. The exhibit will also be open on two Saturdays this fall from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m., on Sept. 23 and Oct. 7.



Facilities Committee Meeting Gives Update on Student Union, Dorms, More

Updates on the planning processes and status of new construction and existing projects on OCC's campus were presented to faculty and staff on Sept. 7 at a Facilities Planning Committee meeting. The following projects were addressed:

1. **Kinesiology & Aquatic Center, Phase I:** This facility will include two pools and support spaces, in addition to locker rooms, faculty and staff offices, equipment storage, and classrooms. Architecture consulting firm LITTLE has met with multiple constituency groups to gain insight into what students, faculty, coaches, staff, and others would like to see included in the facility. The next phase will be design development, followed by construction documents. The anticipated opening date for the Kinesiology and Aquatic Center is Fall 2020.
2. **Student Union:** Construction documents are 50 percent complete for OCC's new Student Union. Architecture firm tBP discussed recent changes to their design, including relocating some offices and programs from the first to the second floor of the building, as well as ideas for making up for lost parking spaces due to an expanded footprint. The firm also discussed some cost saving measures, including reduction in landscaping and alternative building materials. The projected date of completion for the Student Union is January 2021.
3. **Student Housing:** The College's student dormitories are still in the Design Development phase, with affordability, accessibility, sustainability, and efficiency being some key drivers for the project.

The facility will house approximately 800 beds and 300 parking spaces, and will include alternative transportation options, including bike trails. The project will be a public/private partnership, and program management company Brailsford & Dunlavey currently is seeking financing from private investors. An estimated completion date of Summer 2020 is expected.

4. **Language Arts & Social Science Building:** In its final project proposal phase, the Facilities Committee and its subcommittees are in the process of selecting an architect to head phase II of the College's IDC project (phase I was the construction of the Math, Business and Computing Center).
5. **Current Project Updates:** construction updates were given for the College's dock renovations at the OCC School of Sailing and Seamanship in Newport Beach, the OCC Planetarium, the OCC Recycling Center, and Legacy Hall and Garrison Honors Center. Some projects are scheduled to finish this semester, such as the Recycling Center which opens this week and the Garrison Honors Center which will open in the coming weeks. Others currently are under way or will be soon, such as the Planetarium — for which a concrete dome has been poured — and the dock renovations, which are slated to begin later this semester and will be completed in 12 months. Some smaller projects being undertaken by OCC's Maintenance and Operations department include the remodel of the Astronomy building, an HVAC upgrade for the College's Faculty House, turf replacement on the soccer and baseball fields, and a seat replacement in the Fine Arts lecture hall.

The next Facilities Planning Committee meeting will take place on October 5 at 2:30 p.m. in the Administration Building, room 108.

Orange Coast College to Host Info Events For Dreamers This Fall

OCC will host several events aimed at helping students who fall under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program plan their next steps.

A general information session was held Thursday, Sept. 14 at 3:30 p.m. in the College's Multicultural Center. The session was in partnership with University of California, Irvine's Dreamers Center and will address the winding down of DACA, as outlined by a memorandum released by the Department of Homeland Security, as well as assist students with questions about their individual circumstances.

A DACA Renewal session will be held on Wednesday, Sept. 20 from 5-9 p.m. in the OCC Student Center Lounge. The session will be held in partnership with OC Immigrant Youth United and will assist those who are eligible for DACA renewal.

More information sessions will be announced as they are scheduled, and this year's Constitution Day on Wednesday, Sept. 20 will discuss the end of the program.

Enrollment Summary for First Day of Fall 2017

OCC saw an uptick in enrollment on the first day of the Fall 2017 semester compared to last year. According to a Enrollment Summary compiled by the College's Institutional Effectiveness Office:

Overall, Fall 2017 enrollment on the first day was similar to 2016 despite an increase in seats scheduled and sections offered. However, from 2017 to 2016, first-day headcount increased by 2.1% or a gain of 457 students. Seat count enrollment decreased very slightly (-0.1%) despite seats scheduled and section count increasing (2.2% and 3.2%, respectively). The fill rate decreased -1.9% points in 2017 compared to 2016.

Overall, estimated FTES increased slightly over last fall (0.9%) with non-resident FTES accounting for most of the increase. Estimates show a slight increase in resident FTES (0.2%) compared to a 9.1% increase in international and 2.9% increase in out-of-state FTES from last fall.

Students appeared to have more access to courses in Fall 2017 with decreases from last fall in sections closed (-4.0%), waitlist counts (-9.8%), and sections waitlisted (-2.1%).

OCC Campus Safety Offers Safety Training for National Preparedness Month

Orange Coast College's Campus Safety department will host a day of safety training on Tuesday, Sept. 26 in honor of National Preparedness Month.

Vendors and safety officials will be on hand in OCC's Quad from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. to provide information and answer questions about how to be prepared for disasters.

The Costa Mesa Fire Department will host a "sidewalk CPR" training to give students, faculty and staff and brief overview of the life-saving technique. The Orange County Sheriffs Department also will be on hand to educate employees and students on Alert OC notification system.

The College's Student Health Center will have information about mental health services on campus, and Campus Safety will screen a showing of the film "Shots Fired On Campus: When Lightning Strikes" which focuses on how to respond when an active shooter is in the vicinity. The film will be shown in the Math, Business and Computing building, room 162, at 3 p.m.

Additional showings may be added, depending on how many people attend, and extra credit slips will be available.



Pirates Stun Hawks With 2-0 Win

The Orange Coast College women's soccer team pulled off a feat that hasn't been accomplished in over 13 years ... the Pirates topped soccer kingpin Santiago Canyon, 2-0, on Sept. 15 at SCC, in an Orange Empire Conference matchup.

Since 2004, the Hawks have been one of the most dominant teams in California Community College sports history, winning 13 consecutive OEC titles. They have 12 regional finals, five state finals, two state championships and one national championship over that span, while notching a 282-21-24 record (.895 winning percentage) over that span.

Also since 2004, the Pirates have an 0-29-1 record against the Hawks, including four playoff defeats, but on Friday, that winless streak against their longtime nemesis.

"I'm so proud of the girls. They really played a solid match against a top-quality opponent," OCC head coach Kevin Smith said. "We left it all on the field and we countered against their aggressive style very well. We played good, solid, compact defense and our goalkeeper (Alison Marlow) made the big saves when we needed them."

Marlow, who finished with six saves for the afternoon, kept the Pirates (4-1-2, 2-0-0 in conference) tied with the Hawks (3-2-1, 0-1-1), who were fired up following a surprising 1-1 tie against Irvine Valley earlier in the week.

Finally, just six minutes into the second half, Mackenzie Dean sent in a perfectly timed through-ball to teammate Tiffany Chantler and the freshman forward chipped in a shot over SCC's goalkeeper Siera Pedroza (two saves) to make it 1-0, Pirates.

It stayed that way until the 75th minute, when a free kick by Samantha Oliver was misjudged by Pedroza and the ball found its way to Hailey Auer and the freshman forward scored into a wide-open net to give the Pirates a 2-0 advantage.

The Hawks refused to go away, but Marlow and the Pirate defense refused remaining scoring chances for the hosts, giving OCC a win for the ages.

Coast returns to action on Sept. 22 at home against Irvine Valley, beginning at 3 p.m.

Pirates Pick up Wins Over Santa Monica, Citrus in Home Quad

Two Quads, two pairs of wins for the Orange Coast College women's volleyball team following Friday afternoon's victories over Santa Monica and Citrus.

Coast (5-0) opened things up on Friday with a four-set win over SMCC, topping the Corsairs, 25-15, 20-25, 25-17, 25-20. The Pirates relied on sophomore outside hitter Hannah Del Barto for offense and she came through with a match-best 16 kills to go along with eight digs.

Setter Devyn Holland showed off her versatility with eight kills to go along with 27 assists and five digs, while on defense, Rylee Adair notched 17 digs, while Izzy Mariotti added 12 to go along with six kills and three aces.

In the second matchup of the afternoon, Coast again overcame a second-set stumble to dispose of Citrus College, 25-21, 22-25, 25-18, 25-15.

Del Barto again led the way with 17 kills and 11 digs, while the trio of Mariotti (17 assists, 16 digs), Adair (27 digs) and Alibelle Pilimai combined for 21 kills.

OCC's next home match will take place on Wednesday, Sept. 20 against Santiago Canyon at 6 p.m.
